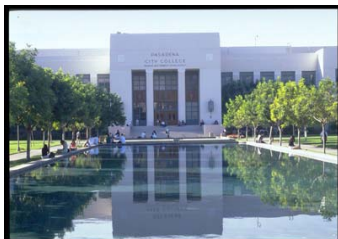


SELF-GUIDED CAMPUS TOUR



INTERESTING FACTS

- **History:** founded in 1924 with a student enrollment of 267
- **Calendar:** school year-August to June; two 16-week semesters; one 6-week winter session; one 6-week summer session
- **Current Enrollment:** 25,000 credit students; 4,000 noncredit students
- **Campus Size:** 53 acres, over 25 buildings; third largest single-campus community college district in the United States
- **Class Schedules:** day, evening, weekend, online, and television courses
- **Majors:** over 60 academic majors and over 70 vocational programs
- **Degrees:** traditional and transfer Associate in Arts (AA) degrees; Associate in Science (AS) degree
- **Financial Aid:** over \$9 million in student grants, loans, scholarships, and work study
- **Transfer Rate:** top five ranking among the 109 California community colleges
- **Scholars Program and Transfer Admission Guarantee Program (TAG):** transfer partnerships with CSU, UC, and private institutions, including UCLA, CSULA, and Pomona College.
- **Activities, Honors:** national math and forensics awards; clubs; student government; Puente Project; Tournament of Roses Band; Title V .XL Program; Fast Track; MESA; Ujima Program; Artist-in-Residence Program
- **Study Abroad:** England, Italy, France, Spain, Baja California, Mexico
- **Intercollegiate Sports:** football, baseball, basketball, softball, badminton, water polo, soccer, volleyball, cross country, swimming, track & field
- **Mascot:** the Lancer, a Roman-type warrior

POINTS OF INTEREST

- **Art Gallery (G Building):** showcases student art and artist-in-residence projects
- **Bookstore (W Building):** textbooks, school and art supplies, stationery, sportswear, student bank
- **C Building:** President's Office; English, Languages, Performing/Communications Arts, and Social Sciences Divisions; Sexson Auditorium-seating capacity 2,000
- **D Building:** Disabled Students Program (DSPS), Testing Center, International Students Office, Learning Assistance Center
- **E Building:** geology and photography labs
- **Forum (UU Building):** one of 3 lecture halls on campus-seating capacity 296
- **GM, W Buildings:** state-of-the-art physical education facilities including pools, fitness center, and football stadium
- **K Building:** music building fully insulated for sound, recital rooms, practice labs
- **L Building:** Admissions/Records/Registration, Career Center, Counseling, EOP&S, Financial Aid, Psychological Services, Transfer Center, Veterans Services, VP of Student & Learning Resources, Harbeson Hall-seating capacity 265
- **Mirror Pools:** campus landmark bordered by the 3 original buildings (C, D, and E)
- **Observatory/Planetarium (O, P Buildings):** dedicated by Albert Einstein in 1931
- **Quad:** central meeting area on campus, site of student activities including concerts and information fairs
- **R Building:** art labs; Business/Computer Technology, Mathematics, and Visual Arts/Media Studies Divisions
- **Sculpture Garden:** art displays, amphitheater
- **Shatford Library (LL Building):** houses over 115,000 texts and online resources, Public Relations Office, KPCC-FM
- **T, V Buildings:** architecture, auto shop, building construction, drafting, and machine shop labs; Engineering & Technology Division; Police and Safety Services; Student Affairs Office
- **U Building:** nursing and science labs; Health Sciences, Natural Sciences Divisions
