Six months later after taking the exam, I felt like a criminal who just got out of jail. Now it was time to wait for results, which did not feel as bad as waiting to take the test; I was always a decent student so I expected a decent score. To my surprise, I got a very low score, which meant I could not go to a university. I did not know what I was going to do. I lost interest in everything. At that time, my mom already retired from work and stayed home. She stayed with me every day. When she knew my score, she said nothing. She sat behind me when I looked over the window while listened



to sad music every day. I knew she always wiped her tears secretly while she looked at me.

A month passed by, my mom manipulated me to register for an AA degree at a lower college. I told her I did not want to go to college because my teacher said we could find a good job in future only through learning in a university instead of a college. In China, only universities were considered higher education; colleges were looked down upon. My mom looked at my eyes with love and said, "Do not compare yourself according to the common social standard, it is not for you. You have a pair of invisible wings and they just have not opened yet. One day when they open, you are going to fly to the sky." I suddenly knew I put myself into a cage to isolate myself.

I went to a college and chose a major that I could register with my score. I did not really like my major but I still studied hard and got three scholarships in the three years of college. I lost my confidence gradually. My mom worried about me and I knew she asked all her friends to look for a job for me secretly. 




Passion Begins with an Open Mind towards Chances
