


### 8 Q's with PCC -- Fall 2024

Project Title: Fall 2024 - 8 Q's with PCC

Survey Audience: 27188 Responses Received: 2133 Response Ratio: 7.85%



The Fall 2024 8 Q's with PCC Survey consisted of eight questions:

- Four questions focused on Artificial Intelligence (AI),
- Two questions addressed Academic Honesty and Dishonesty, and
- The final two questions explored enrollment in online classes and awareness of short-term classes at PCC.


The survey was voluntary and administered to all currently enrolled Fall 2024 PCC students. Students received multiple prompts inviting them to complete the survey between November 11, 2024, and December 8, 2024.

While the response rate of 8% was not optimal, it falls within the typical range for surveys of this nature.



### How often do you use Al tools...ChatGPT, Copilot, etc.




### How useful is AI (ChatGPT, Copilot, etc.) in your educational journey?




From the above survey responses, most students indicated they do not use AI (ChatGPT, CoPilot, etc.) in their college work or outside of their college work (63% and 57% respectively).

In contrast, 60% of the students who responded indicated that AI was **somewhat useful** or **very useful** in their educational journey. This doesn't quite line up with the previous responses.

# What form(s) of guidance around Al would be helpful to you as a PCC student? Check all that apply




The two most common activities students reported using AI for are **brainstorming ideas** and as an **internet search tool**.

Students expressed a preference for **guidelines in class syllabi regarding Al use**, along with instruction on its **appropriate and ethical use**, as well as **risks and concerns** associated with its usage.


### Do you agree with this definition of Academic Honesty?

Academic honesty is the scholarly practice of maintaining integrity in all aspects of academic work. It assumes a scholar is producing her/his/their own original work. This is evidenced by giving proper credit to others' ideas / contributions through appropriate citations and avoiding dishonest behaviors (e.g., plagiarism, cheating, falsifying data, using unauthorized resources during assignments/tests, etc.).




#### Do you agree with this definition of Academic *Dishonesty*?

Academic <u>Dishonesty</u> is the act of representing the words, ideas or information of another person as one's own. This may include but is not limited to: copying and pasting all/part of a paper from another source without proper citation, fabrication of details, paying someone to write a paper, copying answers from an exam, lying about a reason for missing an assignment deadline, etc.




Survey respondents were first presented with a definition of **Academic Honesty** and the a definition of **Academic Dishonesty**. 91% of the respondents agreed with the definition of **Academic Dishonesty**. 87% agreed with the definition of **Academic Dishonesty**.

## If you are enrolling or have enrolled in a fully online class, why did you choose online over face-to-face? Choose the best answer.



### Are you aware that PCC offers short-term, 8 and 12 week classes every semester?



The next two survey questions focused on course scheduling. The first question asked students about their primary reason for enrolling in a fully online course instead of a face-to-face course. The most common response was **convenience**, chosen by 40% of respondents. This was followed by 16% of students indicating they had **never taken an online course**, and 11% reporting that **the class was only offered online**.

The final question asked students about their awareness of PCC's short-term course offerings. A significant majority, 85% of respondents, indicated they were aware of these options.
